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QUESTIONS FOR ORAL ANSWER*

- *1. **Mdm Ho Geok Choo:** To ask the Minister for Finance given that it may take three years or so for the Singapore economy to register healthy growth figures, what plans does the Government have with respect to the Jobs Credit Scheme.
- *2. **Mr Liang Eng Hwa:** To ask the Minister for Finance (a) whether the Resilience Package such as the Jobs Credit Scheme and the Special Risk-Sharing Initiative has achieved the results it intended; and (b) what factors will be taken into account when deciding whether these measures should be extended or fine-tuned.
- *3. **Mr Teo Siong Seng:** To ask the Minister for Finance (a) if the Government will consider extending the Jobs Credit Scheme beyond the current year to give local enterprises support and confidence to sustain their business and to continue saving jobs in view of the uncertain economic recovery; and (b) when will the Government announce its decision to withdraw or extend the scheme so that businesses can do forward planning and budgeting for the next financial year.
- *4. **Ms Ellen Lee Geck Hoon:** To ask the Minister for Finance (a) how many offenders of customs and excise related offences, specifically cigarettes smuggling, were prosecuted in the last two years; (b) where vehicles were used in the commission of the offence, how many of these vehicles were detained and forfeited by the court; and (c) whether there were instances where the vehicles were owned by third parties who had no knowledge of the use of their vehicles, and upon due proof were not forfeited but returned.
- *5. **Dr Ong Seh Hong:** To ask the Minister for National Development if he will provide an update on the Sino-Singapore Tianjin Eco-City project and what spin-offs there have been to date for Singapore businesses.

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- *6. Mr Christopher de Souza:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) how many HDB flats do not have lift access on the same floor yet due to the cost of the Lift Upgrading Programme (LUP) going beyond the allocated financial budget and subsidy for each unit; and (b) given the Government's aim to upgrade all flats by 2014, whether the Ministry will consider prioritising the upgrading of blocks which have a disproportionately high number of senior citizens, despite the costs exceeding the budget.
- *7. Mr Zainudin Nordin:** To ask the Acting Minister for Information, Communications and the Arts given the recent successful bid by Singtel to telecast the English Premier League football matches (a) how do the consumers in general benefit from the competition among the pay-TV retailers; (b) whether the media market is large enough to sustain such competition; and (c) how does this competition compare to the ill-fated experiment of SPH's MediaWorks and MediaCorp.
- *8. Dr Lim Wee Kiak:** To ask the Acting Minister for Information, Communications and the Arts with the competitive bidding for popular overseas sports channels by Singtel and Starhub (a) what is the Ministry doing to ensure that subscriptions to the sports channels remain affordable to the majority of Singaporeans; and (b) whether the Government will consider providing free viewing of selected games on Mediacorp TV during key sporting events, especially World Cup soccer matches.
- *9. Mr Calvin Cheng:** To ask the Acting Minister for Information, Communications and the Arts what is being done to address the concern that the exclusive sale of football broadcasting rights has driven up prices and reduced choices, to the detriment of consumers in Singapore.
- *10. Mr Arthur Fong:** To ask the Acting Minister for Information, Communications and the Arts (a) what is the operating profit/loss of the Esplanade since its inception; (b) how has the poor economy affected the Esplanade and its operations; and (c) whether the various programmes organised by the Ministry have brought about an increase in Singaporeans' interest and translated to an increase in ticket sales at the Esplanade.

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- *11. Mr Baey Yam Keng:** To ask the Minister for Manpower in cases where employers of foreign domestic workers are not able to afford the full payment of their maids' medical, hospitalisation and related bills (a) what are the options available to the employers; (b) whether it is possible to put a cap on the maximum liability of the employer; and (c) whether part of the foreign maid levies collected can go towards a fund to pay for the excess beyond the maximum liability.
- *12. Mr Baey Yam Keng:** To ask the Minister for Manpower (a) how the new minimum medical insurance coverage of \$15,000 for foreign domestic workers (FDWs) compares with other countries; (b) what are the percentages, numbers and medians of hospital bills in excess of \$5,000 incurred by FDWs over the last three years; and (c) what is the rationale for requiring employers to face unlimited liability for their FDWs' hospital bills compared to the standard employment contract in which employers have limited liability for their employees' hospital bills.
- *13. Mdm Cynthia Phua:** To ask the Minister for the Environment and Water Resources (a) for the past 5 years, what is (i) the number of hawker stalls let out under the Tender Scheme and Walk-in Scheme; (ii) the average percentage above the reserve price that were bidden for stalls under the Tender Scheme; and (iii) the number of tenancy assignments; (b) whether his Ministry keeps track of the assignment fee paid for such stalls; (c) what is the number of vacant hawker stalls, average period of vacancy and reasons for the vacancies; (d) whether some vacant stalls in each market can be set aside for deserving hardship cases at subsidised rental.
- *14. Mdm Ho Geok Choo:** To ask the Minister for the Environment and Water Resources in view of the impending closure of several privately-owned wet markets (a) what are the implications on wet markets managed by the National Environment Agency (NEA); (b) what has been the takeup rate at these NEA markets and the profile of applicants over the last 10 years; and (c) how has the rate and profile of hawkers at these markets managed by NEA changed over the last 10 years.
- *15. Mr Christopher de Souza:** To ask the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Home Affairs (a) what is the local terrorism threat level after the recent successful operations against terrorist cells in the region; (b) whether such operations have made Singapore and Southeast Asia safer; and (c) what measures Singaporeans can take to maintain our heightened vigilance against terrorist attacks.

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- *16. Mdm Ho Geok Choo:** To ask the Minister for Trade and Industry (a) how can productivity-driven growth be facilitated across the various economic sectors; (b) how should various industries and sectors enhance their human resource management and practices to be productive; and (c) whether he can provide reasons for the drop in productivity in Singapore.
- *17. Mr Arthur Fong:** To ask the Minister for Trade and Industry with the successful completion of F1's second night race in Singapore (a) what is the revenue generated for our economy as compared to the one held last year; (b) how can we further improve on minimising disruptions to businesses in the Marina Bay area as well as traffic into the city; and (c) whether the Ministry will be working with LTA and the race organisers to address the bumpy track of the Marina Bay Circuit.
- *18. Dr Ong Seh Hong:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports whether the Government should be involved in the disciplinary process when match rigging of an international sporting event takes place in Singapore.
- *19. Mdm Cynthia Phua:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) what is the projected supply and demand of HDB flats in the next 5 years; (b) what are the parameters that are taken into account in the projection of the supply and demand of flats; (c) whether the Ministry has considered an annual buffer number of ready flats and, if so, what is the number and the parameters in arriving at that number; and (d) what measures will the Ministry consider in ensuring that first-timers get a new HDB flat within 3 years.
- *20. Er Lee Bee Wah:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) how many new Build-To-Order flats are presently available for selection; and (b) how do the supply and demand factors influence the cost of these flats.
- *21. Mdm Cynthia Phua:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports (a) what are the objectives for building *scape; (b) with a building cost of \$40m, what will be the ongoing investment in the facilities and youth programmes; (c) whether *scape is for the inaugural Youth Olympic Games; (d) who is going to market *scape for international events and how; (e) whether the new media production and editing suites are a private initiative or have government agencies been invited to explore synergies in this area for youths; (f) whether his Ministry is working with MICA to set up a new media library and develop cyberwellness programme with MOE at *scape.

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- *22. Mdm Halimah Yacob:** To ask the Minister for Education (a) what is the dropout rate of students in the Institute of Technical Education (ITE); (b) whether there has been any studies done to ascertain the reasons for such dropouts; (c) whether more teaching resources as well as related services such as counselling will help to reduce the dropout rate; and (d) what happens to the students who dropout of ITE and how they are being assisted to acquire relevant skills to be employable.
- *23. Er Lee Bee Wah:** To ask the Minister for Education (a) what action is the Ministry taking to prevent school children from being lured into working as runners for loan sharks; and (b) how many students have been caught for such activities in the past 12 months.
- *24. Mr Laurence Wee Yoke Thong:** To ask the Prime Minister in mapping out future plans for an integrated holistic approach of service delivery to promote active ageing and general well-being of older persons, whether there will be an apex body to facilitate coordination between the various Ministries as elder care issues cut across several Ministries covering health, finance, accessibility, housing, employment etc.
- *25. Mr Laurence Wee Yoke Thong:** To ask the Prime Minister in view of the ageing population (a) what are the long term plans to promote active ageing; and (b) what are the principles that will be used in considering measures to address the problem of the vulnerable and frail elderly in the community.
- *26. Mr Lim Biow Chuan:** To ask the Minister for Transport why the Preferential Additional Registration Fee and Certificate of Entitlement rebates are not granted to owners of vehicles that are reported lost in situations of a criminal breach of trust.
- *27. Dr Lim Wee Kiak:** To ask the Minister for Transport (a) if he will provide an update on the Park and Ride Scheme; and (b) what are the Ministry's plans, if any, to improve the Scheme to attract more motorists.
- *28. Mr Christopher de Souza:** To ask the Minister for Manpower (a) over the last two and a half years, how many foreign workers have been exploited by unscrupulous agents who promised them jobs which did not materialize and how much debt such workers have incurred in order to work in Singapore; (b) what measures does the Ministry have in place to curb such incidences; and (c) if the Ministry will consider (i) facilitating direct job applications by foreign workers; and (ii) making it compulsory for the employer to settle his worker's debt to his agent in the event of a termination.

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- *29. Mr Calvin Cheng:** To ask the Minister for Manpower given that foreign professionals in the creative and entertainment industries who want to work in Singapore on a freelance or short-term basis are only subject to the Immigration and Checkpoints Authority's approval for short-term Social Visit Passes, whether the Ministry has any plans to issue short-term work passes, to be assessed on work-related criteria, to these professionals in line with other jurisdictions such as Hong Kong and Japan.
- *30. Mrs Mildred Tan:** To ask the Minister for the Environment and Water Resources (a) if he will give an update on the \$1 billion blueprint for Singapore's sustainable development that was unveiled in April 2009, in particular the incentives for greener options such as electric cars and solar energy; and (b) whether his Ministry has any future plans or undertaken any measures to stimulate green businesses in Singapore.
- *31. Mr Teo Siong Seng:** To ask the Minister for the Environment and Water Resources (a) whether the Government has set aside sufficient industrial zones specifically for the recycling industry to support our sustainable development initiatives; and (b) whether his Ministry will provide affordable land and other incentives to encourage local enterprises to upgrade their capability and play a greater role in these industrial zones.
- *32. Mr Baey Yam Keng:** To ask the Minister for Trade and Industry for major international competitions like the Miss World beauty pageant where contestants represent their respective countries, whether greater supervision and regulation of the local organisers responsible for selecting the winner-representative for Singapore is necessary in order to protect the brand name of our country.
- *33. Ms Joscelin Yeo:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports (a) whether his Ministry plays a part in governing the hiring process of foreign coaches at the national sporting level; (b) if so, what processes are in place to safeguard such coaches from being dismissed by national sports associations shortly after arrival and athletes from being affected by their new coach's dismissal; and (c) if not, what are the considerations for not stepping in to govern this process.
- *34. Mr Seah Kian Peng:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports (a) in each of the last three years, what is the amount that the Government spent year on sporting activities for the disabled and how does this compare with other countries; and (b) whether more can be done for the disabled who are non-athletes to help them lead a sporting and active life, as much as their disability will allow.

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- *35. Er Lee Bee Wah:** To ask the Minister for Transport (a) what action has been taken against cyclists who pose a danger to pedestrians; (b) what are the penalties imposed on these cyclists; and (c) whether his Ministry will consider licensing all motorised bicycles with motors below 200 watts.
- *36. Dr Lim Wee Kiak:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) what is the total number of permanent residents (PRs) who own HDB flats and the distribution pattern of PRs in the various public housing estates; (b) whether his Ministry will ensure that there is a good mix of PRs in the various housing estates to encourage better integration with Singaporeans; and (c) whether his Ministry will consider expanding the current policy on racial mix for HDB flats to include PRs.
- *37. Assoc Prof Paulin Tay Straughan:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) whether there are plans to locate HDB studio apartments for the elderly in mature estates where there are significant proportions of elderly households so as to minimize geographical displacement of these residents; (b) what types of amenities will be incorporated to make these communities elder-friendly; (c) whether these studio apartments for the elderly will be integrated with various apartment types so that there will be no spatial segregation of the elderly from the rest of the community.
- *38. Mr Lim Biow Chuan:** To ask the Minister for National Development if he will clarify the reason why HDB allows the sale of recess area and common corridor space to some flat owners and not to others living in the same block of flats but who applied to purchase the areas later.
- *39. Ms Denise Phua Lay Peng:** To ask the Minister for Manpower if he has plans to set up Continuing Education and Training centres for the disabled since similar efforts were already made for non-disabled Singaporeans.
- *40. Assoc Prof Paulin Tay Straughan:** To ask the Minister for Manpower (a) whether he has received feedback from employers, especially SMEs, on how they have managed to provide for the 16-week maternity benefits; (b) what proportion of employers engage temporary staff to augment staff strength when employees are on maternity leave; (c) where no temporary staff are engaged, how do employers distribute the workflow and compensate staff who have to cover for colleagues on maternity leave; and (d) what concerns have been raised by employers or employees about the extended maternity benefits.
- *41. Mr Calvin Cheng:** To ask the Minister for the Environment and Water Resources whether his Ministry will consider prohibiting all works on construction and building sites near hospitals and residential areas on Sundays and public holidays.

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- *42. Mr Terry Lee:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports (a) what recent studies have been done on the day-to-day living conditions of the aged, especially those in destitute; (b) what are some of the difficulties they face daily and whether the Public Assistance Scheme addresses the majority of it; (c) what other plans are there besides encouraging pro-creation or increasing the labour force to prevent the decline of the old-age support ratio; and (d) what other financial assistance programmes are there to help such elderly destitute families.
- *43. Mdm Halimah Yacob:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports (a) if he will give an update on the proposal to set aside \$16 million to improve the thirty-six Family Service Centres; (b) how far has the work progressed; and (c) whether this will include increasing the number of social workers and putting in place a proper system for training and improving their salaries and benefits.
- *44. Dr Ong Seh Hong:** To ask the Acting Minister for Information, Communications and the Arts (a) how many Malay and Indian arts and cultural shows have been carried out in Singapore for the last one year; and (b) what will be done to promote more of our Malay and Indian cultural shows.
- *45. Mdm Halimah Yacob:** To ask the Minister for Manpower (a) what more can be done to enhance safety at workplaces in view of the recent spate of workplace accidents; (b) whether the system of contracting and subcontracting which is widely practised in some industries has aggravated the problem; and (c) how effective is the whistle blowing mechanism in helping workers to raise the alarm on dangerous situations.
- *46. Mr Seah Kian Peng:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports if he will consider including more women in the category of those eligible for maternity leave, specifically expectant mothers working with the same employer but for less than 3 months, contract workers, including teachers, with fewer than 3 months' service at the relevant time, and retrenched expectant mothers outside the third trimester.
- *47. Assoc Prof Paulin Tay Straughan:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports (a) in the last five years, what is the number of locally registered marriages between Singaporean grooms and foreign brides as a result of matchmaking services; (b) what is the incidence of divorce for these marriages; and (c) what is the resilience of such marriages given that there is often a cultural and language barrier involved in such marital unions.

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- *48. Ms Joscelin Yeo:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports whether his Ministry has plans to actively pursue sponsors from the private sector for the sporting fraternity and why such sponsors have not been actively pursued in the past.
- *49. Mr Arthur Fong:** To ask the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports whether the decision by some of the American athletes not to compete in the Singapore 2010 Youth Olympic Games has been communicated to the Singapore organisers and, if so, what is the impact of this on the event.

2. **Mr Liang Eng Hwa:** To ask the Minister for the Environment and Water Resources (a) what is the number and amount of ex-gratia payments made to the first-generation stallholders who have been affected by the Hawker Centres Upgrading Programme since its inception; (b) what is the rationale for not according the next of kin who took over the stall after July 1992 the same treatment as first-generation stallholders; (c) whether his Ministry and NEA have been flexible in handling cases where the stallholders are the elderly spouse of the deceased first-generation stallholders; and (d) what is the number of disputes since the programme was introduced.
