QUESTIONS FOR ORAL ANSWER*

- *1. Ms Joan Pereira:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health in view of the Nipah virus (NiV) high case fatality rate (CFR), whether the Ministry will (i) require health declarations and conduct screening of passengers arriving from or who have recently been in high-risk areas at our ports of entry and (ii) provide healthcare advisories and information to doctors and the public.
- *2. Mr Gerald Giam Yean Song:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health (a) what is the progress of local research into Nipah virus diagnostic kits and vaccines; (b) whether Singapore currently possesses or has plans to develop Biosafety Level 4 laboratory capacity for such vaccine testing; and (c) what grants or subsidies support local firms to ensure such research remains viable without a commercial market.
- *3. Mr David Hoe:** To ask the Minister for Education (a) in each of the last five years, what proportion of students who participated in the Uplifting Pupils in Life and Inspiring Families Taskforce (UPLIFT) programme are placed in posting groups 3, 2, and 1 or equivalent academic streams after their PSLE; and (b) whether the Ministry has observed improvements in these posting or other educational outcomes for UPLIFT participants over time.
- *4. Ms Denise Phua Lay Peng:** To ask the Minister for Digital Development and Information (a) what alternative Singpass identity verification options are available for users with medical conditions that prevent facial verification, and who wish to set up digital tokens with banks; and (b) whether the Ministry will review current requirements to ensure that such users are not excluded from essential services while upholding security standards.
- *5. Mr Melvin Yong Yik Chye:** To ask the Minister for Manpower pertaining to the voluntary safety time-out focused on vehicular safety from 13 to 27 January 2026, what specific enforcement or inspection actions, if any, has the Ministry taken to ensure that companies not only pause operations but also implement concrete improvements to vehicular safety practices.
- *6. Mr Yip Hon Weng:** To ask the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade and Industry in view of the 10% US tariff imposed on Singapore and the nearly 30% year-on-year decline in exports to the US (a) what criteria does the Ministry use to determine when such tariff impacts translate into price pressures for everyday Singaporeans, especially lower-income households; and (b) how often are these criteria reviewed.
- *7. Mr Kenneth Tiong Boon Kiat:** To ask the Minister for Manpower (a) what is the Ministry's operational definition of a "good job" as used in the Economic Strategy Review; (b) what measurable indicators will the Ministry use to track whether the strategy is creating such jobs; and (c) whether the Ministry will adopt a multi-dimensional job quality framework comparable to that published by the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development.

- *8. **Mr Christopher de Souza:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment (a) what is the latest assessment of transboundary haze affecting Singapore; and (b) whether bilateral and regional measures to mitigate haze are being reviewed and strengthened.
- *9. **Ms Hazlina Abdul Halim:** To ask the Acting Minister-in-charge of Muslim Affairs what induction or onboarding plans have been developed for the committee of the Singapore College of Islamic Studies, if any, to (i) better understand the objectives of the College, (ii) appreciate the aspirations of the community and (iii) cater to the profile of the students.
- *10. **Ms Hazlina Abdul Halim:** To ask the Acting Minister-in-charge of Muslim Affairs (a) what is the technical, professional and operational expertise contributed by non-Muslim members serving on the committee of the Singapore College of Islamic Studies; and (b) how do their roles support the College's governance, institutional development and administrative effectiveness, while complementing the Islamic studies mission of the College.
- *11. **Mr Gerald Giam Yean Song:** To ask the Minister for Digital Development and Information (a) what is the projected expenditure on the Government's strategies for global leadership in growth areas and an AI-empowered economy; (b) whether the Government will fund ambitious exploratory projects with breakout growth potential through a Government-owned AI corporation; and (c) whether the Government considers such entities more effective than foreign entities at pursuing projects where data sovereignty and public interest are paramount.
- *12. **Mr Yip Hon Weng:** To ask the Minister for Education given that problematic gaming intersects mental health, education, student welfare and youth social development (a) whether the Ministry can elaborate on the current framework for cross-ministry coordination on this issue; and (b) whether preventive policy has emerged as a joint strategic priority.
- *13. **Dr Hamid Razak:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health (a) whether the current tiered-care mental health model explicitly includes individuals with neurodevelopmental conditions, such as attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and autism, who have co-occurring mental health needs; and (b) if not, what clinical pathways and funding support are available when such individuals seek public psychiatric or psychological care.
- *14. **Mr David Hoe:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health (a) whether all polyclinics currently offer video consultations for non-emergency acute conditions in a primary care setting; (b) if not, whether there are plans for polyclinics not offering such telemedicine services to introduce them; and (c) if so, what are the expected timelines for implementation in these polyclinics.
- *15. **Mr Cai Yinzhou:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs (a) in each year between 2020 and 2025, how many traffic accidents occurred along Tanah Merah Coast Road and how many of these involved cyclists; (b) what are the primary causes of cyclist accidents and whether they are primarily due to heavy vehicle movements and road debris; and (c) what steps will the Ministry take in preventing accidents along this stretch of road.
- *16. **Ms Gho Sze Kee:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) whether HDB has reached its targeted supply of 4,000 units under the Parenthood Provisional Housing Scheme by the end of 2025; and (b) what does this mean for the success rate of just married or affianced couples applying to the scheme.

- *17. **Mr Melvin Yong Yik Chye:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment in view of the Aviation Meteorological Programme launched by CAAS and NEA in December 2025 (a) whether similar cross-agency programmes are being considered for sectors with high exposure to adverse weather risks, such as construction and maritime; and (b) whether such programmes can strengthen workplace safety for workers exposed to adverse weather risks.
- *18. **Mr Edward Chia Bing Hui:** To ask the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade and Industry (a) what is the Ministry's assessment of Singapore's energy resilience and grid stability in light of the anticipated increase in renewable energy deployment; and (b) what measures are being taken to manage intermittency risks and ensure reliability of supply.
- *19. **Ms Poh Li San:** To ask the Acting Minister for Transport whether the Ministry will consider extending the maximum age limit for holders of Private Hire Car Driver's Vocational Licences beyond 75 years old on an annual basis provided they are certified fit to drive by doctors.
- *20. **Assoc Prof Jamus Jerome Lim:** To ask the Acting Minister for Transport (a) what criteria LTA uses to prioritise rail line upgrades such as transitions from single-car to two-car operations; (b) whether ridership thresholds, infrastructure readiness, or other factors were considered in prioritising the Punggol LRT ahead of the Sengkang LRT; and (c) if so, what the corresponding figures or assessments were for each system.
- *21. **Mr Saktiandi Supaat:** To ask the Acting Minister for Culture, Community and Youth (a) how many complaints or appeals regarding selection processes for junior athletes in National Sports Associations have been received in the past five years, that the Government is aware of; (b) of these, how many were investigated; and (c) what safeguards exist to ensure that selection is fair, transparent, and not influenced by socio-economic background, if any.
- *22. **Dr Hamid Razak:** To ask the Minister for Education (a) what progress the Ministry has made since February 2025 in developing and implementing sector-specific advertising guidelines for tuition and private education services; (b) whether a code of conduct has been finalised; (c) what its key provisions are; and (d) how the Ministry will monitor and enforce compliance to protect parents and students from fear-based marketing.
- *23. **Assoc Prof Jamus Jerome Lim:** To ask the Minister for Education (a) whether Singaporeans who are private candidates for the GCE O-Level examinations are disadvantaged in their allocation to junior colleges if they do not participate in the Joint Admissions Exercise (JAE); and (b) whether the Ministry can assure candidates who secure sufficient points for junior college admission that they are able to enroll in one, even without participating in the JAE.
- *24. **Ms Diana Pang Li Yen:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health (a) what criteria do the Ministry and the Agency of Integrated Care use to locate and roll out Active Ageing Centres (AAC) in new BTO estates such as Hougang Olive and Bartley Beacon; (b) how demand, accessibility and senior population projections for AAC are assessed; and (c) whether indicative timelines for establishment of AACs will be shared with residents.
- *25. **Ms Nadia Ahmad Samdin:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs what mandatory follow-ups or structured intervention pathways are in place to manage serious cases such as sexual misconduct, and violence involving children below the minimum age of criminal responsibility, particularly if there are multiple victim reports or sustained patterns of harm.

- *26. **Ms He Ting Ru:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs (a) whether the Government has assessed if any information arising from the Epstein Files in the United States has potential links to or implications for Singapore, including possible links to human trafficking or sexual offences involving minors; and (b) whether any follow-up actions are being considered by the Government.
- *27. **Ms Diana Pang Li Yen:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) what URA planning criteria govern the permitted uses and concentration of trades in shophouses along Geylang Road, including massage, Traditional Chinese Medicine, hair salons and pubs; and (b) whether URA will review and tighten such restrictions to manage the impact in buildings where structural limits to soundproofing have led to complaints of chronic disturbance.
- *28. **Mr Gerald Giam Yean Song:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment (a) whether the midge population at Bedok Reservoir from since November 2025 is larger compared to previous years; (b) whether studies have been conducted on midge resistance to current biological larvicides; (c) whether there are plans to rotate chemical controls; and (d) what is the measurable effectiveness of LED diversion in reducing midge counts in residential units.
- *29. **Mr Saktiandi Supaat:** To ask the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade and Industry (a) what are the Government's latest observations on (i) profitability and rents in the F&B industry and (ii) business closures, profitability and rents in the retail industry; and (b) whether the Government is considering any additional support or regulatory adjustments to foster sustainable small business growth and preserve vibrancy and heritage in neighbourhood and city-centre retail ecosystems.
- *30. **Mr Melvin Yong Yik Chye:** To ask the Acting Minister for Transport following the autonomous vehicle collision with a road divider on 17 January 2026 (a) whether investigators are adequately trained to distinguish system faults from human error; and (b) how will investigation and accountability frameworks be strengthened to safeguard workers supervising these systems as the adoption of autonomous vehicles expands.
- *31. **Mr Low Wu Yang Andre:** To ask the Acting Minister for Culture, Community and Youth (a) how many fitness corners and other freely accessible public fitness facilities are installed in parks, housing block flats and other public places; and (b) of these, how many are equipped with adjustable or variable resistance machines capable of higher impact progressive strength training as opposed to fixed-resistance or bodyweight stations.
- *32. **Ms Gho Sze Kee:** To ask the Minister for Education whether schools are resourced and equipped to (i) deal with any possible negative impact of posting group (PG) banding and (ii) promote inclusivity, interaction and friendships across different PGs in the same class.
- *33. **Mr Kenneth Tiong Boon Kiat:** To ask the Prime Minister and Minister for Finance (a) based on the Year of Assessment (YA) 2025 data, how many working mothers with children born from 2024 paid higher income tax following change from percentage-based to fixed-dollar Working Mother's Child Relief; (b) what is the projected additional tax revenue over the next decade as the affected cohort grows; and (c) whether this projected revenue is consistent with the objective of encouraging higher-order births.

- *34. **Mr Cai Yinzhou:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health (a) whether the Ministry plans to onboard Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) practitioners to the National Electronic Health Record (NEHR); (b) if so, what is the timeline; (c) what technical and financial support will be provided to TCM clinics to upgrade their practice management systems; and (d) how will the Ministry ensure data interoperability between TCM diagnostic terminology and Western medical records within NEHR.
- *35. **Mr Dennis Tan Lip Fong:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs whether the Government intends to legislate mandatory and standardised disclosure of odds and probability ranges for blind box or ‘gacha’ products sold in Singapore.
- *36. **Mr David Hoe:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) whether HDB will consider assigning parent and child applicants a single joint queue number and one booking appointment to select two units concurrently under the Family Care Scheme (Joint Balloting); and (b) if not, what alternative measures can HDB introduce to avoid scenarios where one party cannot secure a unit due to their queue number assigned.
- *37. **Mr Dennis Tan Lip Fong:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment (a) what proportion of recyclables from the blue recycling bins have been exported in 2025; (b) which are the primary destination countries; and (c) what robust verification measures are in place to ensure that such exported recyclables are legitimately recycled and not subjected to overseas dumping or rejection by host countries.
- *38. **Mr Low Wu Yang Andre:** To ask the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade and Industry whether the mandate of the forthcoming National Space Agency of Singapore will include (i) developing or encouraging the development of a domestic capability to launch small payloads or microsatellites to orbit and (ii) the funding of research into emerging launch technologies to enable such a capability and for potential export.
- *39. **Mr Dennis Tan Lip Fong:** To ask the Acting Minister for Transport (a) whether an update can be provided on the progress of (i) Circle Line stage 6 and (ii) Thomson-East Coast Line stage 5 and Downtown Line 3 extension; and (b) whether the Ministry can confirm the specific opening months for these segments following the completion of current tunnel reinforcement and systems integration testing.
- *40. **Mr Mark Lee:** To ask the Minister for Digital Development and Information in light of the 2026 Edelman Trust Barometer indicating that fewer Singaporeans regularly access diverse viewpoints (a) how does the Government assess the risk that information silos may increase susceptibility to misinformation and weaken information resilience during crises; and (b) what steps are being taken to encourage exposure to credible, diverse perspectives.
- *41. **Mr Kenneth Tiong Boon Kiat:** To ask the Minister for Education (a) what have been the findings of the 2020 pilot to remove CCA selection trials; (b) how many schools have adopted the no-trial model; and (c) whether the Ministry will require schools to offer both recreational and competitive CCA tiers so that students wishing to participate for leisure and development are not excluded by selection.
- *42. **Ms He Ting Ru:** To ask the Prime Minister and Minister for Finance (a) what is the Ministry’s position on a finding by the Institute of Policy Studies in January 2026 that policy language may portray citizens as recipients of Government generosity rather than stakeholders; (b) what proportion of Government benefits are framed as tax-funded entitlements versus discretionary handouts; and (c) whether the Ministry will consider reframing its policy language to acknowledge citizens’ contributions.

- *43. **Mr Yip Hon Weng:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health regarding the 21% decline in cancer mortality since 2012 despite rising diagnoses (a) what specific policy decisions or healthcare investments does the Ministry assess as most responsible for this improvement; and (b) how has the Ministry ensured these benefits reached lower-income and less health-literate Singaporeans equally.
- *44. **Ms Gho Sze Kee:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs for traffic offences committed by foreign-registered vehicles in Singapore, how are the responsible motorists identified and summoned, particularly where the vehicle owner or motorist does not reside in Singapore.
- *45. **Ms Nadia Ahmad Samdin:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment how rising geopolitical tensions, climate volatility, and export restrictions have informed the design of the Global Partnerships pillar under Singapore Food Story 2.0.
- *46. **Ms Nadia Ahmad Samdin:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment how the aquaculture plan launched at the end of 2024 fits into the Singapore Food Story 2.0.
- *47. **Assoc Prof Jamus Jerome Lim:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment (a) whether the additional 10-cent-per-bottle charge under the NEA-led Beverage Container Return Scheme is channeled to beverage producers to help offset the costs of collecting and recycling empty containers; and (b) why no such cost offset is provided to (i) NEA for funding reverse vending machines and (ii) town councils for utilities costs incurred.
- *48. **Ms He Ting Ru:** To ask the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade and Industry (a) whether there are estimates of how much of the reported 2025 GDP growth was driven by time-limited vouchers and credits that boost short-term consumer spending; (b) whether the Government has assessed what underlying the economic growth would have been without such measures; and (c) if so, what are these estimates and assessments.
- *49. **Mr Cai Yinzhou:** To ask the Acting Minister for Transport (a) in 2025, how many crimes or traffic violations involved the use of deregistered vehicles; (b) what are the primary sources of these vehicles and whether there is evidence of syndicates facilitating their illegal retention; and (c) how will the Ministry enhance inter-agency coordination to prevent deregistered cars from being used illegally on our roads.

QUESTIONS FOR WRITTEN ANSWER

- Miss Rachel Ong:** To ask the Prime Minister and Minister for Finance whether the Government will work with digital-only banks to provide alternative biometric or non-facial verification options for Singpass, to ensure accessibility for medically vulnerable users who rely on nasal ventilation masks or other medical equipment that obstructs facial recognition.
- Mr Melvin Yong Yik Chye:** To ask the Prime Minister and Minister for Finance whether the Monetary Authority of Singapore intends to amend the Insurance Act to ensure that consumers' interests are protected, as insurance and financial services firms partner e-commerce platforms to distribute their products.
- Ms Joan Pereira:** To ask the Prime Minister and Minister for Finance regarding transactions on credit cards (a) whether the Government will consider requiring banks and card issuers to assume full liability for unauthorised transaction where 3-D Secure (3DS) was not used by the merchant and cardholders promptly reported suspicious activity; and (b) whether the Ministry plans to standardise procedures for cardholder reporting and dispute resolution across financial institutions.
- Mr Low Wu Yang Andre:** To ask the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade and Industry (a) in the last five years, whether the Government has any data on the number of complaints received by CASE, CCS and other public agencies regarding difficulties in cancelling recurring subscriptions or being subscribed to services without express consent; and (b) what are the top sectors contributing to these complaints.
- Mr Dennis Tan Lip Fong:** To ask the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade and Industry (a) whether the Ministry has data on the number of complaints regarding blind box or 'gacha' mechanisms that the Consumers Association of Singapore (CASE) has received annually since 2023; (b) how many of these cases have been referred to Competition and Consumer Commission of Singapore (CCS) for investigation; and (c) what are the outcomes, including any warnings or penalties issued to retailers.

6. **Mr Melvin Yong Yik Chye:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs (a) in the past five years, how many appeals have the Traffic Police received against fines for illegal U-turns, citing Global Positioning System mobile applications that have guided drivers to take the illegal routes; and (b) whether the Police work closely with these navigation companies to rectify such errors.
7. **Mr Low Wu Yang Andre:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs (a) in the past five years, how many business entities were the subject of recurring or repeated police reports regarding sales practices that were subsequently deemed to be civil disputes; and (b) whether the Police tracks such repeated reports to identify potential criminal conduct.
8. **Ms Joan Pereira:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs (a) whether the Ministry will consider raising the penalties for offenders who make fake security threats; (b) whether social media platforms will be held accountable for such posts under the Broadcasting Act 1994; and (c) how will the Government reach out to the public to educate them on the proper reporting channels for incidents rather than posting on social media first.
9. **Mr Kenneth Tiong Boon Kiat:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Public Services and Minister for Defence (a) how many Full-time National Servicemen were enlisted in each of the last 10 years, broken down by the SAF, SPF, and SCDF; and (b) in each of those years, how many Full-time National Servicemen were serving in their second year of national service.
10. **Ms Eileen Chong Pei Shan:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health (a) what is the demographic profile of help-seekers on the national mindline 1771 to date, by (i) age group and (ii) gender; (b) what is the distribution of contacts across (i) telephone (ii) WhatsApp and (iii) webchat channels; and (c) what proportion of help-seekers remain anonymous.
11. **Ms Eileen Chong Pei Shan:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health since the launch of national mindline 1771 in June 2025 (a) what is the total number of contacts received across all channels; (b) what proportion of contacts required (i) immediate crisis intervention (ii) early support and counselling and (iii) wayfinding and referrals respectively; and (c) what are the most common referral pathways.
12. **Mr Dennis Tan Lip Fong:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health (a) over the past five years, what is the percentage of healthcare professionals who have conditional or provisional registration but fail to get full registration after the fixed supervisory and training term; and (b) what are the measures taken to help these individuals attain full registration.
13. **Mr Yip Hon Weng:** To ask the Coordinating Minister for Social Policies and Minister for Health whether the Ministry will grant registered community optometrists role-based access to the National Electronic Health Record to view relevant patient information, as well as to contribute eye-care findings, with the aim of enhancing clinical safety and facilitating seamless care coordination between community providers and public healthcare institutions.
14. **Mr Gerald Giam Yean Song:** To ask the Minister for Foreign Affairs in view that there is no consensus within ASEAN to recognise Myanmar's election (a) what is the Government's assessment of the legitimacy of the Myanmar general election concluded on 25 January 2026; (b) whether Singapore aligns with the ASEAN chair's current position of non-recognition; and (c) how the conduct of this election affects Myanmar's implementation of the Five-Point Consensus.

15. **Mr Yip Hon Weng:** To ask the Minister for Foreign Affairs (a) what are the safeguards to protect security-sensitive information in environmental impact assessments (EIAs) done under the High Seas Treaty since they are publicly accessible; (b) when will EIA protocols across agencies be harmonised with the Treaty to avoid regulatory duplication; and (c) whether a centralised national body will be appointed to oversee compliance and administration of such EIAs.
16. **Ms Diana Pang Li Yen:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment (a) how does NEA respond to complaints of second-hand tobacco smoke from residential homes that affect neighbouring units; and (b) whether stronger intervention, including structured mediation or regulatory measures will be considered for persistent cases in high-density estates.
17. **Mr David Hoe:** To ask the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment (a) whether there have been any recent changes or expansions to the monitoring programme for microplastics and per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) beyond water to sediments and food; and (b) what new findings, if any, have emerged from the most recent monitoring data.
18. **Ms Diana Pang Li Yen:** To ask the Minister for Social and Family Development (a) whether the associated legal and administrative processes are unduly onerous for unmarried and lower-income mothers to adopt their own biological children; (b) what support or fee assistance is available for these mothers; and (c) whether the Ministry will introduce a simpler and more affordable pathway for these mothers to do so.
19. **Ms Eileen Chong Pei Shan:** To ask the Minister for Social and Family Development in respect of the 2,136 spousal abuse cases in 2024 (a) how many involve counter-reports or cross-complaints filed by both parties; (b) what assessment protocols exist to identify the primary aggressor versus defensive responses; and (c) what safeguards prevent abusers from using counter-reports as a coercive control tactic.
20. **Ms Eileen Chong Pei Shan:** To ask the Minister for Social and Family Development of the 2,136 new spousal abuse cases in 2024 that is reported in the Domestic Violence Trends Report 2025 (a) what is the gender breakdown and age distribution of (i) victims and (ii) perpetrators respectively; (b) what is the breakdown by type of abuse; and (c) what are the common referral sources for such cases.
21. **Mr Low Wu Yang Andre:** To ask the Minister for Digital Development and Information (a) whether the Government has data on the amount of feedback received by the Advertising Standards Authority of Singapore or public agencies in the last five years regarding misleading content on social media; and (b) how many of these cases involved paid influencers or sponsored posts without clear disclosure.
22. **Ms He Ting Ru:** To ask the Minister for Education with the implementation of flexible work arrangements (FWA) for teachers (a) whether data is collected on how often teachers are able to work from home; (b) how is this arrangement practicable given the average teacher's workload; and (c) how does the Ministry ensure consistency of implementation across schools.
23. **Assoc Prof Terence Ho:** To ask the Minister for Education (a) what proportion of SkillsFuture Credit utilised in each of the past two years was spent on online subscription-based learning packages; and (b) whether the Ministry tracks the subsequent utilisation of these subscriptions by such learners.

26. **Mr Gerald Giam Yean Song:** To ask the Minister for Law since 2023 (a) what is the annual number of unique Singpass logins to the Community Justice and Tribunals System for Community Disputes Resolution Tribunals claims; (b) of these, how many successfully submitted a claim; (c) which stage of the form has the highest rate of application abandonment; and (d) what is the median length of time taken for successful claim submissions.
27. **Mr Christopher de Souza:** To ask the Minister for Law what additional measures the Government will consider to support residents facing persistent disturbances from errant neighbours who refuse mediation and respond confrontationally, given concerns that existing legal remedies may be costly.
28. **Mr Cai Yinzhou:** To ask the Minister for National Development (a) whether the Ministry will review the retail mix in Toa Payoh to include modern shopping amenities that better serve the evolving demographics of younger families moving in new HDB BTO flats within Toa Payoh East, Caldecott and Mount Pleasant areas; and (b) whether plans for upcoming developments in these areas include a new shopping centre.
29. **Ms Gho Sze Kee:** To ask the Minister for National Development regarding the Lease Buyback Scheme (a) how many flats have been sold to the HDB since the launch of the Lease Buyback Scheme; and (b) what is the average remaining portion of the leases of these flats, broken down by flat type.

31. **Mr Abdul Muhaimin Abdul Malik:** To ask the Acting Minister for Transport (a) what impact do car-lite designations have on vehicle ownership and public transport usage in the 16 gazetted areas since 2019; and (b) what lessons have been learnt from implementing car-lite measures in HDB estates like Bayshore and Ulu Pandan.
32. **Mr Christopher de Souza:** To ask the Acting Minister for Transport in light of the roll out of self-driving shuttle buses (a) whether there is a need to strengthen safety and handover protocols involving autonomous vehicles; and (b) whether liability and insurance regimes that are in place should be further tightened.
33. **Ms He Ting Ru:** To ask the Acting Minister for Transport regarding the fault in the bus arrival timing system (a) how many bus services and commuters were affected; (b) what post-deployment checks are or have been conducted on the vendor's system to ensure accuracy; and (c) whether the reported root cause being a memory cache build-up raised cybersecurity or resilience concerns.

36. **Ms Diana Pang Li Yen:** To ask the Acting Minister for Culture, Community and Youth (a) what objective proximity or density thresholds are used to assess that few or no heartland merchants are found within or near residential areas when onboarding businesses onto the CDC Vouchers Scheme on a case-by-case basis; (b) how many participating merchants are located in malls under this exception; and (c) whether these thresholds will be published to ensure fairness to nearby heartland shops.
